## Beijing Ice Candy

Tanghulu, otherwise known as Beijing Ice Candy, is a popular candied fruit snack that is found in most parts of Northern China. While the hawthorn is the traditional fruit used to make the Tanghulu street snack, modern vendors tend to use other fruits such as oranges, kiwi, blueberries, bananas, grapes, strawberries, and pineapples, among several others.

## Chinese Calligraphy

Chinese calligraphy is the writing of Chinese characters as an art form. The earliest surviving Chinese script dates back over 3,000 years, in inscriptions made for the rulers of the Shang dynasty (circa 1600-1100 BC). Since the fourth century, calligraphy has been practised, prized and collected as an elite visual art across China.
